OSHA Regulatory Developments

Beryllium

- Litigation briefing delayed to November 2
- EEI and labor working to improve FAQ language with OSHA
- Expect final rulemaking record to be reopened to address certain stakeholder concerns (Early 2018?)
 - CCR disposal / recycling transport requirements
 - Definition of "dermal contact"
 - Definition of Beryllium Work Area

OSHA Leadership Meeting

- Loren Sweatt, Deputy Assistant Secretary
 - Joined Agency in late July
 - Senior policy advisor for the House Committee on Education and the Workforce since 2002
- Tom Galassi, Acting Deputy Assistant Secretary
 - Formally director of Enforcement Programs
- Highlighted our longstanding collaborative relationship with OSHA and organized labor
 - Identified issues with ongoing initiatives; obtained commitment to discuss concerns on:
 - Walking Working Surfaces Rule
 - Enforcement



- Launched last year to provide transition, retention, and professional development to military veterans working in the energy industry.
- Based on success of company Veteran Employee Resource Groups.
- Recently elected its first board of directors and officers.
